# Walk to Exploratorium

- **Distance:** About 1 mile along the Embarcadero

  here is infectious, and the views of Alcatraz and the Golden Gate Bridge are
  spectacular. The real stars, however, are the sea lions. These marine visitors
  started arriving after the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake and have since become
  beloved residents. Their playful antics are a joy to watch.

# **Optional: Fisherman's Wharf**

- **Distance:** Less than 0.5 miles from Pier 39
- **Highlights:** If you're up for a bit more walking, continue to Fisherman's Wharf. You can visit the Musée Mécanique, a museum of vintage arcade games, or simply enjoy the waterfront views. For a touch of history, the USS Pampanito, a World War II submarine museum, provides a fascinating glimpse into naval life.
- Hyde Street Pier: Nearby, you'll find the Hyde Street Pier, home to a collection of historic ships at the San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park. You can visit some of these vessels and get a glimpse into San Francisco's maritime

- history.
- **Ghirardelli Square**: Continue south to Ghirardelli Square, a historic chocolate factory turned shopping and dining complex. Sample some delectable chocolate treats and enjoy a break in the charming square.

#### **Lunch and Relax**

 After exploring, you might be ready for lunch. There are numerous dining options along the Embarcadero and Fisherman's Wharf, ranging from casual eateries to upscale restaurants. For a truly San Francisco experience, consider trying some fresh seafood or sourdough bread at Boudin Bistro in Pier 39.

## **Tips for Your Walk:**

- Wear Comfortable Shoes: You'll be walking quite a bit, so comfortable footwear is key.
- Layer Up: San Francisco weather can be unpredictable, with fog rolling in unexpectedly. Wearing layers will keep you comfortable throughout your journey.

- **Weekend Schedule:** Remember that public transportation schedules may vary on weekends, so check the latest times and frequencies.
